# COLOSSIANS

The book of Colossians is a letter written by the Apostle Paul to the "saints and faithful brothers in Christ" in Colossae. It is widely believed he wrote this letter from a prison cell in Rome around 60 A.D.

The main reason Paul writes this letter is to warn Christians about falling into the Gnosticism of the day. Gnosticism was a false belief system that became a collection of thought, combining Greek knowledge of philosophy, paganism that was prevalent in their time, and Jewish culture into Christian doctrine. The problem with this chaotic and open-minded mentality was that each of the elements were considered equally important and relevant. The obvious struggle with this is that each of these stand in direct opposition to one another. This confusion threatened to undermine Jesus' authority and supremacy. Paul stood strong for the ONE truth of the gospel which set out to present Christ as Deity, God in the flesh and the ONLY path to forgiveness, eternal life, and peace.

The main emphasis for this letter is to hold up Christ as the supreme authority and for all Christians to find comfort in this fact. This emphasis is perhaps best articulated in 2:10-11, "For in Him all the fullness of the Deity dwells in bodily form, and in Him you have been made complete, and He is the head over all rule and authority."

Within the letter Paul writes to the Colossians he details the preeminence of Christ and the inheritance we have when we are baptized into Him, putting to death the old man and putting on the new man. Paul explains the blessings of setting our minds on heavenly goals and cleaning up our behavior. Paul reminds us of our family responsibilities and the importance of doing our best, no matter what we pursue in the Lord. Our speech and conduct are to be used as a tool to make every opportunity for influence powerful and effective.
